<p>Thursday 26 October 2017 at 7.30pm: 'Is Sutton Part of Black History?' Sean Creighton, an independent historian of slavery, abolition and British Black history, will discuss Sutton's connections with Africans and people of African descent who have been living and working in Britain for centuries. <p>Thursday 22 February 2018 at 7.30 pm: 'Sutton Borough's Varied Bus and Rail Services and how they have changed over the past decades'. John Parkin, local transport enthusiast and historian, shows a selection of pictures of trams, trolleybuses, buses and trains to illustrate the way that routes have evolved, vehicle types have come and gone and the way we travel has changed in past decades, where often the backdrop to a photo can depict the many social changes many of us have lived through. <p>Thursday 22 March 2018 at 7.30pm: 'The Ponds: Houses and People 1890 - 1914'. John Phillips looks at local historical records of houses and people to find out what it was really like living in Carshalton in the vicinity of the ponds around the turn of the century and the years leading up to the First World War and how they might have inter-acted. <p>Thursday 26 April 2018 at 7.30pm: 'Edwardian London'. City of London Guide Ian Bevan, this talk looks at London at the beginning of the 20th century when the death of Queen Victoria heralded the dawn of an Edwardian era with the British empire at its zenith. London was the heart of that empire and new buildings and monuments in the capital reflected the confidence of an Imperial power. London also hosted a Franco-British Exhibition, the Olympic Games and a Festival of Empire that bolstered that image. However, there were tensions as workers unionised, immigration added to the pressures, and women pushed for the vote. Tickets: £4.00 (£5.00 for non-members)</p>
