<p>London 1914-39 - Thursday 27 June at 19:30 City of London Guide Ian Bevan starts his talk with the First World War and its effect on Londoners. After the Armistice, London was the scene for protests of various sorts including the General Strike in 1926. However, in the inter-war years, new transport developments encouraged the growth of the suburbs with new and exciting architecture. Also, new buildings were erected in the modernist style for industry and entertainment e.g. cinemas. London too hosted spectacular events like the British Empire Exhibition as well as FA Cup Finals, Test matches and success at Wimbledon. <p>Lavender - Mitcham and Beyond - Thursday 25 July at 19:30 This presentation, from Alison Cousins of The Wandle Industrial Museum, covers many aspects of lavender – the former “industry” in the Mitcham area and the families involved, the best known of whom were Potter & Moore. Also, a few growing tips and the speaker's favourite varieties, cosmetic and medicinal applications, a short history and social snippets. A few lavender recipes will be available for any foodies and the talk will end with a few thoughts on the revival of the industry today and where you can go to buy the best selection of plants. <p>Unexpected Treasure - Thursday 26 September at 19:30 Sutton High School was founded in 1884 by the Girls' Day School Company, whose purpose was to provide a 'public school', liberal education for middle-class girls. The school is fortunate enough to possess a substantial archive which includes magazines, log-books, various artefacts and a wealth of photographs. The archive reveals the school to be a microcosm of national events such as the two World Wars and the development of women's rights. It gives us a unique, sometimes poignant and occasionally humorous insight into Sutton's past as will be revealed by Sue James. Tickets: £4.00 (£5.00 for non-members)</p>
